The Arlington and Mossop Hotels were secured to be used as additional hospital space. Staff recruited from staff at City Hall worked throughout the night removing carpets, cleaning rooms and walls, and sterilizing mattresses. Together, these hotels could accommodate 200 patients.

There were seven deaths in the city hospitals in the last twenty-four hours.

Yesterday was no holiday for the Department of Health, who are doing all possible to fight the Spanish influenza epidemic. Two hotel properties, the Arlington and the Mossop, are being rapidly prepared as temporary hospitals, and other buildings are under consideration.

Dr. Hastings, M.O.H., believes that bad as the disease is at present the number of cases will increase for a week or more before the crest is passed. He is accordingly laying plans to increase the equipment and staff that will be used to fight it.
