Welcome to St. James Cathedral

This sacred land is the territory of several Indigenous Nations - the Wendat, the Haudenosaunee, and the Anishnaabe, with special recognition to the Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation. We also acknowledge that we are on the shores of Niigaani-gichigami/Lake Ontario. This territory is governed by the Dish With One Spoon Wampum Belt Treaty, an agreement between the Haudenosaunee Confederacy and the Anishnaabe Confederacy to peaceably share and sustain the life of the Great Lakes. In the spirit of that Treaty we seek to place at the centre of our gatherings the values of respectful reciprocity, diversity, peace, responsibility, and mutual aid.

In the context of Christian Liturgy, Israel does not refer to the current political state, but either to the historic Hebrews of the ancient Near East or, in Christian theology, to all people who put their faith and trust in Jesus Christ.

First Lesson

1 Maccabees 2: 29-43, 49-50

Reader

At that time many who were seeking righteousness and justice went down to the wilderness to live there, they, their sons, their wives, and their livestock, because troubles pressed heavily upon them. And it was reported to the king's officers, and to the troops in Jerusalem the city of David, that those who had rejected the king's command had gone down to the hiding-places in the wilderness. Many pursued them, and overtook them; they encamped opposite them and prepared for battle against them on the sabbath day. They said to them, 'Enough of this! Come out and do what the king commands, and you will live.' But they said, 'We will not come out, nor will we do what the king commands and so profane the sabbath day.' Then the enemy quickly attacked them. But they did not answer them or hurl a stone at them or block up their hiding-places, for they said, 'Let us all die in our innocence; heaven and earth testify for us that you are killing us unjustly.' So they attacked them on the sabbath, and they died, with their wives and children and livestock, to the number of a thousand people.

When Mattathias and his friends learned of it, they mourned for them deeply. And all said to their neighbours: 'If we all do as our kindred have done and refuse to fight with the Gentiles for our lives and for our ordinances, they will quickly destroy us from the earth.' So they made this decision that day: 'Let us fight against anyone who comes to attack us on the sabbath day; let us not all die as our kindred died in their hiding-places.'

Then there united with them a company of Hasideans, mighty warriors of Israel, all who offered themselves willingly for the law. And all who became fugitives to escape their troubles joined them and reinforced them.

Now the days drew near for Mattathias to die, and he said to his sons: 'Arrogance and scorn have now become strong; it is a time of ruin and furious anger. Now, my children, show zeal for the law, and give your lives for the covenant of our ancestors.

REMEMBRANCE DAY

We all know that the month of November means ‘remembrance’ to us Christians – we begin the month with All Saints’ and All Souls, about which the Vicar wrote so compellingly last week. November also means changes – a time change, dramatic changes in our experience of daylight and darkness, changes from the commercial focus on Hallowe’en right into full-blown Christmas! It also, of course, includes November 11 – Remembrance Day. For over one hundred years, the Eleventh Hour of the Eleventh Day of the Eleventh Month has been a solemn and important ‘moment’ – sometimes rarely more than a moment – in which we honour those who have given the ultimate sacrifice and all those who have served in armed conflicts over the years. The ways in which we ‘keep’ Remembrance Day have changed so much in the memory of many of us – from the almost mandatory attendance at large and colourful church services, replete with regiments of military personnel, bands playing, bugles sounding – to civic services which are now mostly observed on the weekends which bookend the actual day. For too many years, some of us remember, November 11 seemed only to celebrate the victors and vilify the enemy. It has taken much of that century of Remembrance Days to acknowledge that it is for peace that we stop and remember; it is for reconciliation among peoples that we pray, offer our hymns, keep moments of silence, and ‘still’ the world. So, too, here at the Cathedral we have welcomed the regiments with whom we have historic connections, we have gathered at our own cenotaph; we have silenced our bells for a moment.

Our children (and our grandchildren) have been the beneficiaries of school programmes that have taught so much and raised such keen awareness among our next generations – much more so than those of us who were children of veterans and grew up in families directly connected to either of the World Wars or the conflict in Korea. The generations that follow have spoken much more of peace than we did; they have an appreciation of the poppy that we maybe lacked; they are much richer for those educational opportunities.

Some of us long for the ‘good old days’ of Choral Matins with rows of pews full of magnificently clad soldiers, sailors, and aviators. But those good old days will not come again – much better that we gather at our local cenotaphs, remember appropriately and deeply, offer our prayers together in church in the context of the Eucharist – the ultimate feast of forgiveness and reconciliation. We have ‘kept faith’ with those who fought and fell – we will remember them!
