

We start this third week of Advent standing in the shadow of the candles of *Hope* and *Peace*. Hope is the capacity to acknowledge the challenges and difficulties of life, and the refusal to be imprisoned by them. Peace (*shalom*) has to do with health, prosperity, harmony, and wholeness, total flourishing. This week, we reflect on *Joy*.

The picture of the doting grandfather provides an image of "happiness". To the observer, happiness is written all over his face. Only "granddad" knows what he is experiencing, only he knows what others may think he is feeling, only he knows the joy that is written in his heart. It is a feeling of deep pleasure and delight, like the tingling sensation of "bubbly" making its way over the palate.

Christian joy is like that and more. It is the thrill of knowing that we share in the story of God. From the garden in Genesis to the garden in the book of The Revelation to John, the story is all about God breaking into our lives and then we, God's people, going out into the world as witnesses to God's goodness and desire that all be invited to share and included in that life.

The Luke-Acts narrative provides us with seven reasons for such *joy* as was experienced in the Early Church. In Luke's account of the gospel, there was joy because the Saviour was born (2:10); discipleship was worth its cost (6:23); the sick and lost were healed and rescued (13:17; 15:5); Jesus is the king (19:37).

In the Book of Acts of the Apostles, there was joy because the church was the Lord's community both inside and outside (2:46); the word of God had reached the nations (8:39; 13:48); the nations obeyed the word (11:23).

Joy results when we recognize that we live in Christ, that Christ lives in us, and that we live, not for ourselves but for others. It is nourished when we shift our attention from ourselves and the mistaken view that "life revolves around me" and strive to cultivate an attitude that reaches out to others with the holy intention to embrace them, enhance their lives as we share ourselves, our hopes, and dreams with them, and they with us. **Do you feel the joy?**
