Welcome to St. James Cathedral

This sacred land is the territory of several Indigenous Nations - the Wendat, the Haudenosaunee, and the Anishnaabe, with special recognition to the Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation. We also acknowledge that we are on the shores of Niigaani-gichigami/Lake Ontario. This territory is governed by the Dish With One Spoon Wampum Belt Treaty, an agreement between the Haudenosaunee Confederacy and the Anishnaabe Confederacy to peaceably share and sustain the life of the Great Lakes. In the spirit of that Treaty we seek to place at the centre of our gatherings the values of respectful reciprocity, diversity, peace, responsibility, and mutual aid.

Liturgical Note

In the context of Christian Liturgy, Israel does not refer to the current political state, but either to the historic Hebrews of the ancient Near East or, in Christian theology, to all people who put their faith and trust in Jesus Christ.





HAPPY NEW YEAR

'And I said to the man who stood at the gate of the year:

'Give me a light that I may tread safely into the unknown.'

And he replied:

'Go out into the darkness and put your hand into the Hand of God. That shall be to you better than light and safer than a known way.'

These now famous words, written, in 1939 by English poet Minnie Haskins, as a preamble to her 1908 poem, 'God Knows', have gone on to become very well known – much better than the poem for which they were written. They were spoken, of course, by King George VI in his Christmas broadcast, to a country (and an Empire), facing the very present reality of war. While it could be said that we, looking to 2023, do not face quite the same set of concerns or with the same degree of immediacy, it certainly can be argued that we, along with our fellow humans, face even more frightening and apocalyptic realities. But, just like those first listeners over 80 years ago, we look forward, not backwards. We know that, however difficult and intractable things can seem, we live as people of hope and faith. We do know that, to put our 'hand into the Hand of God' means that we are not alone and without wit and wisdom to address the multiple challenges of our current world.

We come to this place – this Cathedral, which has been a beacon of light, providing generation upon generation of people, helping them 'to tread safely into the unknown' – to be nourished by word and sacrament, to join hands with friends of this community, to reach out to the world which sometimes seems very dark, and to be the light, the hope, and the promise of new life.

May our 2023 be a year of fresh beginnings, cherished and comfortable traditions, and exciting opportunities. May we shine brightly and walk boldly together.

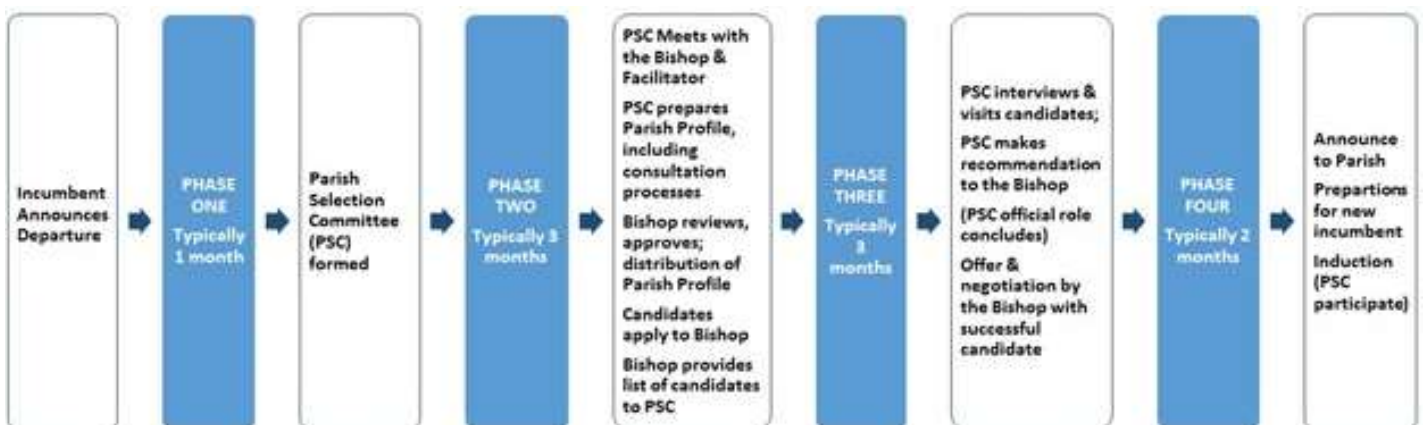
Parish Selection Committee Update

Bishop Andrew has approved the Parish Profile text. We hope to release the profile this month on his advice. As St. James has revitalized over the past year, frequent revisions to the Profile have been needed to continue to reflect a current picture of the parish.

As you can see from the Timeline of the Parish Selection Process below, we are deep in phase 2. Once the profile has been released, candidates may apply to the bishop.

The parish selection committee will continue to design an interview process that focuses on the characteristics outlined in the "What We Seek" section of the Parish Profile and the generous input we have had from parish members, clergy past and present, and the Bishop.

We are planning an information session with the parish to discuss the process in the early part of 2023 and to answer questions about how the search will go forward in the new year.
