

Welcome to St. James Cathedral

This sacred land is the territory of several Indigenous Nations - the Wendat, the Haudenosaunee, and the Anishnaabe, with special recognition to the Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation. We also acknowledge that we are on the shores of Niigaani-gichigami/Lake Ontario. This territory is governed by the Dish With One Spoon Wampum Belt Treaty, an agreement between the Haudenosaunee Confederacy and the Anishnaabe Confederacy to peaceably share and sustain the life of the Great Lakes. In the spirit of that Treaty we seek to place at the centre of our gatherings the values of respectful reciprocity, diversity, peace, responsibility, and mutual aid.

First Lesson *Please be seated.*

Jeremiah 26: 1-15

Reader At the beginning of the reign of King Jehoiakim son of Josiah of Judah, this word came from the Lord: Thus says the Lord: Stand in the court of the Lord's house, and speak to all the cities of Judah that come to worship in the house of the Lord; speak to them all the words that I command you; do not hold back a word. It may be that they will listen, all of them, and will turn from their evil way, that I may change my mind about the disaster that I intend to bring on them because of their evil doings. You shall say to them: Thus says the Lord: If you will not listen to me, to walk in my law that I have set before you, and to heed the words of my servants the prophets whom I send to you urgently—though you have not heeded— then I will make this house like Shiloh, and I will make this city a curse for all the nations of the earth.

The priests and the prophets and all the people heard Jeremiah speaking these words in the house of the Lord. And when Jeremiah had finished speaking all that the Lord had commanded him to speak to all the people, then the priests and the prophets and all the people laid hold of him, saying, 'You shall die! Why have you prophesied in the name of the Lord, saying, "This house shall be like Shiloh, and this city shall be desolate, without inhabitant"?' And all the people gathered around Jeremiah in the house of the Lord.

When the officials of Judah heard these things, they came up from the king's house to the house of the Lord and took their seat in the entry of the New Gate of the house of the Lord. Then the priests and the prophets said to the officials and to all the people, 'This man deserves the sentence of death because he has prophesied against this city, as you have heard with your own ears.'

Then Jeremiah spoke to all the officials and all the people, saying, 'It is the Lord who sent me to prophesy against this house and this city all the words you have heard. Now therefore amend your ways and your doings, and obey the voice of the Lord your God, and the Lord will change his mind about the disaster that he has pronounced against you. But as for me, here I am in your hands. Do with me as seems good and right to you. Only know for certain that if you put me to death, you will be bringing innocent blood upon yourselves and upon this city and its inhabitants, for in truth the Lord sent me to you to speak all these words in your ears.'

St. James, the Apostle

Today marks the Sunday on which we keep our Patronal Feast. The actual day is July 25 – interestingly situated between the Feast of St. Mary Magdalene (July 22) and St. Anne (July 26). The church keeps holy days and remembers the great heroes and heroines of our past – James, Mary Magdalene, and Anne bright stars among them. While we never know as many biographical details as we would like, Saint James the Apostle is presented in the Gospels as 'the brother of John'. He is also called James 'the Greater' in order to distinguish him from two other New Testament 'James'. Like other disciples, he was called from his life as a Galilean fisherman to follow Jesus. He is one of the three disciples chosen by Jesus to witness the Transfiguration. He figures highly in gospel healing accounts,

(2011) and the agony of the garden of Gethsemane.

In the Book of Acts we read of Herod's persecution of the 'new' church and the beheading of James, making him the first of the apostles to suffer death for the sake of Christ. James is one of the best-loved saints of the Spanish people; a legend claims that the body of James was miraculously transported across the Mediterranean in a stone coffin and rested at Compostela in Spain. His shrine has become one of the great centres of pilgrimage and to this day remains a much-visited shrine, and the destination of the Camino de Compostela, which so many are now walking. (With gratitude to the late Dr. Stephen Reynolds and his book: 'For All the Saints')

And so, our Cathedral is dedicated to the Patronage of this early saint – we don't know exactly how or when the name 'St. James' came to be for this church – it was long before it was a Cathedral; indeed, long before the Diocese of Toronto existed. The naming of parishes has always been the prerogative of the Bishop, so it was probably Bishop Jacob Mountain, Bishop of Quebec (of which diocese we were then part) who named us – there is evidence that by early in the 1800's, the name St James was being used. And St. James we have remained – first as a parish church and then as the Cathedral for the Diocese of Toronto.

Celebrating our Patronal Festival gives us a real chance to remember our forebears and benefactors, to give thanks for the wondrous ministry that has taken place here for so long, and to commit ourselves anew to the exciting work which is on our doorstep, and which lies in our future.
