

Welcome to St. James Cathedral

This sacred land is the territory of several Indigenous Nations - the Wendat, the Haudenosaunee, and the Anishnaabe, with special recognition to the Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation. We also acknowledge that we are on the shores of Niigaani-gichigami/Lake Ontario. This territory is governed by the Dish With One Spoon Wampum Belt Treaty, an agreement between the Haudenosaunee Confederacy and the Anishnaabe Confederacy to peaceably share and sustain the life of the Great Lakes. In the spirit of that Treaty we seek to place at the centre of our gatherings the values of respectful reciprocity, diversity, peace, responsibility, and mutual aid.

Reader

Now Laban had two daughters; the name of the elder was Leah, and the name of the younger was Rachel. Leah's eyes were lovely, and Rachel was graceful and beautiful. Jacob loved Rachel; so he said, 'I will serve you seven years for your younger daughter Rachel.' Laban said, 'It is better that I give her to you than that I should give her to any other man; stay with me.' So Jacob served seven years for Rachel, and they seemed to him but a few days because of the love he had for her. We know that all things work together for good for those who love God, who are called according to his purpose. For those whom he foreknew he also predestined to be conformed to the image of his Son, in order that he might be the firstborn within a large family. And those whom he predestined he also called; and those whom he called he also justified; and those whom he justified he also glorified. What then are we to say about these things? If God is for us, who is against us? He who did not withhold his own Son, but gave him up for all of us, will he not with him also give us everything else? Who will bring any charge against God's elect? It is God who justifies. Who is to condemn? It is Christ Jesus, who died, yes, who was raised, who is at the right hand of God, who indeed intercedes for us. Who will separate us from the love of Christ? Will hardship, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or sword? As it is written, 'For your sake we are being killed all day long; we are accounted as sheep to be slaughtered.' No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us. For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor rulers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.





Emancipation Sunday



Canadians are not always aware that Black and Indigenous Peoples were once enslaved on this land. In 1628, Olivier LeJeune was recorded as the first enslaved African to live here. In May 1689, following complaints about labour shortages in New France (now Canada), Louis XIV of France permitted the colonists to enslave Pawnee Native Americans and Africans. This scourge on humanity continued for the next 200 years.

The legacy of slavery still haunts our landscape. In June 2020, Bishop Andrew Asbil wrote, "Let's be honest: racism and discrimination are in the Church, too. Sometimes we don't see our bias. Sometimes we downplay how our systems and policies treat people differently based on the colour of skin, language, and culture...... We pledge to continue to wear the mantle of racial reconciliation and healing, to be leaders in this important ministry."

Our National Church has made a commitment to walk this path. I continue to call our church to issue an apology for the pain and grief meted out to her Black membership. Many have left the Anglican Church. Many have remained, but have opted to disengage from the system, so that they may engage with the God who truly loves them.

Surely an apology is not enough. It becomes meaningless when those who have been hurt have to ask for it. We should not have to ask for one. That notwithstanding, our church must put the necessary process in place to make it possible for our church to do the right thing. Without this overdue-apology, all future actions may be considered disingenuous.

In the words of Professor Kortright Davis of The Howard University School of Divinity, "Black people are the only people whose claim to humanity has not been universally recognized". The evidence suggests that Black people may be emancipated but are still working towards freedom.
