ANNA KWIATKOWSKA, SOPRANO

Anna Kwiatkowska is a soprano and violist, originally from Poland. After graduating from Music Academy in Lodz, Poland, where she received MMus in viola and in vocal and acting performance, she continued her education at the University of California in Los Angeles, CA (UCLA, Faculty of Opera Performance). Ms. Kwiatkowska's operatic roles include Tytania in Britten's "Midsummer Night's

Dream" (UCLA), Rosina in Rossini's "Il barbiere di Seviglia", Despina in Mozart's "Così fan tutte" and Sandrina in "La Cecchina by Piccini (Musiakademie Rheinsberg).

Apart from her work as a soloist, Ms. Kwiatkowska has always had a strong interest in choral singing. From early childhood she regularly participated in choral courses in Poland and abroad (Landesakademie Ochsenhausen) and performed in professional settings (Philharmonic in Lodz, Poland, Grand Theatre in Lodz, Poland). In 2008, as a member of Wroclaw Philharmonic choir, she had the privilege to join the famous Gabrieli Consort and Players ensemble, directed by Paul McCreesh. The concert tour with Gabrieli included performances at Salle Pleyel in Paris, Barbican Centre and Albert Hall in London (BBC proms festival). In Canada, Ms. Kwiatkowska has appeared with Opera Atelier, Gryphon Trio, Tafelmusik Choir, Toronto Chamber Choir and St. James Cathedral Choir.



CHRISTINA STELMACOVICH, MEZZO SOPRANO

A native of Toronto, Canada, mezzo soprano Christina Stelmacovich is a winner of several international vocal competitions. Her singing has been described as "...stylistically spot-on and vocally splendid." (Dave Richards, Toronto Concert Reviews). Her career has included performances in Canada, the United States, Austria, Italy, England and Mexico. Christina has appeared as a soloist with

some of the most prestigious choirs and orchestras some of which include the City of Birmingham Choir and the Renaissance Singers of England, The Elora Singers, the Toronto Mendelssohn Choir, Tafelmusik Baroque Choir and Orchestra, Early Music Vancouver, Early Music Voices of Calgary, the Grand Philharmonic Choir of Kitchener and the New World Orchestra of Mexico City. Equally comfortable on the soloist's stage as well as singing with professional vocal ensembles, Christina is currently a member of The Elora Singers. When not performing, Christina works as the Manager of the Elora Festival and Singers, as an adjudicator with the Kiwanis Music Festival and as a Mom.



JACOB ABRAHAMSE, TENOR

In the 2023/2024 season, Jacob Abrahamse performed Alfredo in Verdi's La Traviata (Brott Opera). He was also the tenor soloist in the Toronto Mendelssohn Choir's presentation of Bach's Mass in B Minor at Koerner Hall. This season, Abrahamse joins the Santa Fe Opera as an Apprentice Singer, an internationally recognized program that is one of the finest of its kind. In concert, Abrahamse

will perform as the tenor soloist in two performances of G.F. Handel's Messiah. First, with choir and orchestra at St. James Cathedral. Second, with the Toronto Symphony Orchestra in a benefit concert for United Way. Abrahamse will also perform as the tenor soloist in W.A. Mozart's Requiem with the Toronto Beach Chorale and Orchestra. He will reprise this oratorio with the Mississauga Chamber Singers and Orchestra.

Abrahamse debuted at Roy Thomson Hall as a tenor soloist with the Toronto Symphony Orchestra and the Toronto Mendelssohn Choir in Felix Mendelssohn's Elijah. He also made his operatic debut by creating the starring role of the Holy Child in the Dora-award-winning premiere of R. Murray Schafer's opera, The Children's Crusade.



DION MAZEROLLE, BARITONE

Acadian baritone Dion Mazerolle has forged a solid reputation in Canada and Europe as an artist of the highest calibre. A former member of the Atelier lyrique de l'Opéra de Montréal, he is acclaimed for his musical finesse and strong stage presence, both in opera and in concert. Dion recently made his debut as Golaud in Debussy's Pelléas et Mélisande, created by the Barbe & Doucet design team

at the Teatri di Piacenza in Italy and debuted as le Roi de Trèfle in Prokofiev's surreal opera L'Amour des trois oranges with Opera National de Lorraine in Nancy, France. In 2024, Dion joins the cast as Osman in Rameau's Les Indes Galante, with Nouvel Opéra Métropolitain/Festival Classica.

Dion has performed with many of Canada's orchestras, choirs and chamber ensembles including the Elmer Iseler Singers, the Grand Philharmonic Choir, Festival International de Musique Baroque de Lamèque, and Regina Symphony Orchestra.

Dion's concert engagements this season include Carmina Burana with the Guelph Chamber Choir, Haydn's Creation with Galileo Orchestre and Don Quichotte chez la Duchesse (Boismortier) with Ensemble Caprice. He returns to Kitchener as a guest soloist in Estacio's The Houses Stand not Far Apart and Mozart's Requiem, with Grand Philharmonic Choir.



THOMAS BELL, CONDUCTOR

Thomas Bell is a church musician, composer, and teacher.

His early musical education was as a boy chorister at Salisbury Cathedral, England, where in addition to singing for the daily choral services he played the flute, violin, and piano. His subsequent musical studies at Durham University, were augmented by flute lessons with two teachers: Patricia Morris (BBC Sym-

phony) and David Haslam (Northern Sinfonia of England). Tom then taught music at several schools in Oxford and London, including New College Choir School and the Dragon School, Oxford. During this time, he directed several professional instrumental and choral ensembles specializing in early music.

Tom later immigrated to Toronto, Canada, where together with Susan, they have lived and worked and raised their family for over thirty years. Tom directed the 150-voice Mississauga Children's Choir for sixteen years, winning many competitions including the CBC Choral Competition (children's choirs category), and touring across Canada and abroad. He also taught class music at the Toronto French School for nearly thirty years.

His compositions are published by Oxford University Press, Boosey and Hawkes, Alliance, Hinshaw, and others.

Thomas is presently Director of Music and Organist at Trinity College, University of Toronto; and at St. James Cathedral, Toronto.

The Restoration of the Organ of St. James Cathedral

We are most fortunate at St. James Cathedral to have such a fine and historic organ. It is played every day for worship, practice, teaching, and the popular lunchtime recitals. The new console has added immeasurably to the instrument, a perfect marriage of the latest technology and traditional artistry which will last for many generations.

In its original form, the organ dates from 1853 when Samuel Warren of Montreal was commissioned to design an organ for the new cathedral. Over the years it has been greatly enlarged and revised, taking its present shape in 1936. However - beautiful though it is - the organ has aged and is in urgent need of restoration. Pipes are difficult to tune, there are leaks in the wind supply, and the mechanism which allows pipes to sound, including the leathers, is near the end of its life. In addition .

Much of the instrument has not been serviced for eighty years.

We would like to restore our beautiful instrument, enabling it to become the very best version of itself, allowing future generations to fully enjoy its music without the worry of constant repairs. The expertise and time required to make this happen requires financial support.

Early in the New Year we will share details of the plans formulated by Letourneau Organs, who created our beautiful console.

In the meantime, however, we would be most grateful to hear from you if you have any suggestions or questions regarding our cherished instrument. We know that it is a much-loved by the community at St. James and beyond.
