Dear Friends

February 25, 1996

Greetings and welcome to you in the name of Jesus Christ.

Beginning in June of 1994 a group of black Anglican clergy had a few informal gatherings to determine whether or not a caucus of Black Anglicans was needed in this Diocese to enhance our shared ministry. The diocesan multicultural initiative, No Longer Strangers, is a great boost to this group, and after its Visioning Conference last April, it became evident that a caucus of Black Anglicans was indeed necessary in this diocese.

One of the calls by black people at this conference was the need for more relevant worship. So taking that challenge, some of the clergy, now joined by a few lay people, concentrated their efforts on worship. Being also aware that there were few religious events during Black History Month, we planned this celebration and a diocesan consultation for clergy and lay workers. Giving ourselves a name, Black Anglicans Coordinating Committee (B.A.C.C.), we set out on our first project which is this event. "Celebrating Our Black Heritage" is an Anglican eucharistic liturgy, so we hope that many of you will take elements from this celebration to implement in your parishes.

The planning group wishes to thank a great number of people who have helped make this celebration possible. The Right Rev'd Terence Finlay has been supportive of the work of this group since its inception in June of 1994 and we are grateful for his ministry to us. The Very Rev'd Douglas Stoute, Dean of Toronto, has welcomed us to the cathedral on many occasions, and we thank him for his offer again today. He and the staff of St. James have certainly made us feel that the cathedral is a place for the whole Anglican communion in this diocese. Mr. Giles Bryant, Organist and Choirmaster of the Cathedral, has been supportive and gracious in not only offering the place of organist today to a young musician from the black community, but also in joining the choir and sharing his expertise. A warm welcome and thanks to The Rev'd Dr. Kortright Davis who enthusiastically accepted our invitation to preach at this historic event.

The Community Ministries Board of the Diocese of Toronto has been invaluable in the persons of Ms Ann Keating and Dr. Hazel Campayne. They have encouraged us with their offers of time and financial support.

We appealed to parishes across the diocese for their support, and the response has been phenomenal. The music and dance you experience today is primarily the efforts of volunteers. The Caribbean Chorale, and members of a variety of Anglican Churches make up our choir this evening; and The St. Stephen's Liturgical Dance Group are providing their colourful and exciting interpretation of two hymns. And what black event would be complete without drummers and steel pan? We are grateful that Ballet Créole and The Panatics are here with us today. Heartfelt thanks to the organist, Mr. John Bryan, and choral director, Ms Eulalie Walling Sampson, who gave of their time and talent to this endeavour. Music is vital in black worship and these two people are making it happen today.

The servers, ushers, readers, and intercessors have been crucial to the flow of the liturgy and we thank them for their quick response when asked to participate. They are from seventeen parishes in our diocese.

Parishes have also made financial contributions to this worship service, and we acknowledge them with our thanks: St. James Cathedral; St. John's, Norway; St. Michael and All Angels; St. Michael the Archangel, Scarborough; St. Stephen's, Downsview; Church of the Nativity, Scarborough; and St. Joseph of Nazareth, Bramalea.

What a great day is this! Thanks to all of you for coming, and we hope you will join us after the liturgy for light refreshments, prepared by women from several parishes. We also ask your support for an annual occurrence of "Celebrating Our Black Heritage."
