Welcome to St. James Cathedral

This sacred land is the territory of several Indigenous Nations - the Wendat, the Haudenosaunee, and the Anishnaabe, and the Métis peoples, with special recognition to the Mississaugas of New Credit. This territory is governed by the Dish With One Spoon Wampum Belt Treaty, an agreement between the Haudenosaunee Confederacy and the Anishnaabe Confederacy to peaceably share and sustain the life of the Great Lakes. In the spirit of that Treaty we seek to place at the centre of our gatherings the values of respectful reciprocity, diversity, peace, responsibility, and mutual aid.

THE PROCLAMATION OF THE WORD

The First Reading

Reader Meanwhile Saul, still breathing threats and murder against the disciples of the Lord, went to the high priest and asked him for letters to the synagogues at Damascus, so that if he found any who belonged to the Way, men or women, he might bring them bound to Jerusalem. Now as he was going along and approaching Damascus, suddenly a light from heaven flashed around him. He fell to the ground and heard a voice saying to him, 'Saul, Saul, why do you persecute me?' He asked, 'Who are you, Lord?' The reply came, 'I am Jesus, whom you are persecuting. But get up and enter the city, and you will be told what you are to do.' The men who were travelling with him stood speechless because they heard the voice but saw no one. Saul got up from the ground, and though his eyes were open, he could see nothing; so they led him by the hand and brought him into Damascus. For three days he was without sight, and neither ate nor drank.

> Now there was a disciple in Damascus named Ananias. The Lord said to him in a vision, 'Ananias.' He answered, 'Here I am, Lord.' The Lord said to him, 'Get up and go to the street called Straight, and at the house of Judas look for a man of Tarsus named Saul. At this moment he is praying, and he has seen in a vision a man named Ananias come in and lay his hands on him so that he might regain his sight.' But Ananias answered, 'Lord, I have heard from many about this man, how much evil he has done to your saints in Jerusalem; and here he has authority from the chief priests to bind all who invoke your name.' But the Lord said to him, 'Go, for he is an instrument whom I have chosen to bring my name before Gentiles and kings and before the people of Israel; I myself will show him how much he must suffer for the sake of my name.' So Ananias went and entered the house. He laid his hands on Saul and said, 'Brother Saul, the Lord Jesus, who appeared to you on your way here, has sent me so that you may regain your sight and be filled with the Holy Spirit.' And immediately something like scales fell from his eyes, and his sight was restored. Then he got up and was baptized, and after taking some food, he regained his strength.

Deacon After these things Jesus showed himself again to the disciples by the Sea of Tiberias; and he showed himself in this way. Gathered there together were Simon Peter, Thomas called the Twin, Nathanael of Cana in Galilee, the sons of Zebedee, and two others of his disciples. Simon Peter said to them, 'I am going fishing.' They said to him, 'We will go with you.' They went out and got into the boat, but that night they caught nothing.

Just after daybreak, Jesus stood on the beach; but the disciples did not know that it was Jesus. Jesus said to them, 'Children, you have no fish, have you?' They answered him, 'No.' He said to them, 'Cast the net to the right side of the boat, and you will find some.' So they cast it, and now they were not able to haul it in because there were so many fish. That disciple whom Jesus loved said to Peter, 'It is the Lord!' When Simon Peter heard that it was the Lord, he put on some clothes, for he was naked, and jumped into the lake. But the other disciples came in the boat, dragging the net full of fish, for they were not far from the land, only about a hundred yards off.

When they had gone ashore, they saw a charcoal fire there, with fish on it, and bread. Jesus said to them, 'Bring some of the fish that you have just caught.' So Simon Peter went aboard and hauled the net ashore, full of large fish, a hundred and fifty-three of them; and though there were so many, the net was not torn. Jesus said to them, 'Come and have breakfast.' Now none of the disciples dared to ask him, 'Who are you?' because they knew it was the Lord. Jesus came and took the bread and gave it to them, and did the same with the fish. This was now the third time that Jesus appeared to the disciples after he was raised from the dead.

When they had finished breakfast, Jesus said to Simon Peter, 'Simon son of John, do you love me more than these?' He said to him, 'Yes, Lord; you know that I love you.' Jesus said to him, 'Feed my lambs.' A second time he said to him, 'Simon son of John, do you love me?' He said to him, 'Yes, Lord; you know that I love you.' Jesus said to him, 'Tend my sheep.' He said to him the third time, 'Simon son of John, do you love me?' Peter felt

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hurt because he said to him the third time, 'Do you love me?' And he said to him, 'Lord, you know everything; you know that I love you.' Jesus said to him, 'Feed my sheep. Very truly, I tell you, when you were younger, you used to fasten your own belt and to go wherever you wished. But when you grow old, you will stretch out your hands, and someone else will fasten a belt around you and take you where you do not wish to go.' (He said this to indicate the kind of death by which he would glorify God.) After this he said to him, 'Follow me.'

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Financial Update – Q1 2025

The Cathedral

- Total offerings and donations were very close to budget. Stewardship offerings for Q1 (Jan 1 Mar 31) were 4% below budget. Open donations and other donations in outreach and Faithworks have increased.
- Rental revenue almost doubled the budget due to increased corporate bookings and film rentals. The net rental revenue in Q1 was \$153,148, which is better than budget by \$104,822. We continue to receive many rental inquiries for the remainder of the year, but with the uncertainty in the current economic conditions, it is difficult to anticipate rental activities in the next quarter.
- Total Q1 expenses were \$565,337, lower than budget by \$125,842, as we have four vacant staff positions. Although the hiring process has taken a significant time, all four positions will be filled by the end of Q2.
- The net first-quarter Cathedral operating deficit before depreciation was (\$88,957), which was better than budget by \$202,932. The deficit was also lower than YTD last year by \$27,667.

Cemetery

- Cemetery revenue was less than budget by \$94,194. Crematorium revenue was better than budget by 4% and better than last year by 50%. However, grounds sales were 54% lower than budget, mainly due to slow sales of burial lots.
- Crematorium business continued to return at a steady pace as the preferred vendor arrangement with one vendor has worked satisfactorily.
- Expenses were less than budget because of a delay in hiring additional help in groundskeeping and a delay in some repairs and maintenance projects.
- Q1 Cemetery surplus was \$969, which was worse than budget by \$70,473 before applying any interest expense and any transfer to capital revenue.

Bequest


We received an unrestricted bequest in March of \$36,926. The receipt was added to the Warden's Legacy Fund.

Special Purpose Funds

The amount spent in Q1 included \$27K for the AV system for the Cemetery Chapel, \$8K for Refugee Sponsorship, Food bank donations, Dean's conference, and other expenses.

Q1 of 2025 showed better-than-budget overall results, mainly due to an increase in rental revenue and significant savings from four vacant staff positions in the Cathedral operation. The combined Cathedral and Cemetery operations recorded a deficit of (\$110,489), much less than the budgeted deficit of (\$242,947).
