

Stanley Baptiste is a cradle Anglican who has been attending St. James for over 20 years. A member of Cathedral Council, Stanley is also a communion minister and was until recently a Sidesperson. He volunteers at the Friday drop-in. Through his involvement in Cathedral Council, Stanley has become familiar with the challenges and opportunities facing St. James and believes that he can contribute to making the right choices.

Bill Benson -- As a cradle Anglican, Bill has been a member of St James since the spring of 2020. During his time at the Cathedral, it has been his pleasure to act as a Sidesperson, lead a discussion group for the BST program and grilled more hamburgers than he cares to remember. Apart from life at St James, he is a member of the Diocesan Postulancy committee (15 years) and for over 20 years volunteered as a consultant for the Diocesan Congregational Development Department working in many parishes across the Diocese. In 2020, Bill was elected to the Board of Trustees of Wycliffe College and this spring, he became Chair of the Board. He retired from full time employment in the winter of 2021 after 45 years in Senior Sales and Marketing roles in the Consumer-Packaged Goods world.

Marie Crosta has been a dedicated member of the congregation since 2015, when she and her family first joined the church community. Her connection to the church deepened when her son was baptized here, marking the beginning of her active involvement in church life. Marie currently volunteers with the children's Sunday School program; she finds great joy in helping nurture the faith of the next generation. Professionally, Marie serves as the Director of Academic Planning and Student Affairs at Toronto Metropolitan University. Her career in post-secondary education reflects her passion for community development, thoughtful leadership, and student advocacy—values she also brings into her faith life. Over the past two years, Marie has served as an alternate Synod Representative. Through this experience, she has gained insight into the broader work of the church and now feels called to take a more active role in shaping its future. She is committed to representing the voice of her congregation with dedication and integrity and hopes to contribute meaningfully to the work of the Synod in building a stronger, more inclusive church community.

Angela David has been a parishioner at St. James Cathedral for well over 30 years, mostly attending the 9:00am service, where she serves as a steward and Communion Minister. She was previously a member of the Cathedral Council as well as the Deputy Peoples' Warden and was also actively involved with the Nomination Committee. With a professional background in finance, she has been actively involved in operating committees at her daughter's pre-elementary, elementary, and secondary Schools. She was a member of the Board of Directors of the Tandia Financial Credit Union, actively involved in "Merger/Amalgamation" Transition Committees.

Peter Dawes has been an Anglican since childhood in Montreal where he attended Anglican schools. When he moved to Toronto in the late 60's, he became a parishioner at St. Paul's on Bloor Street. Peter has been a parishioner at St. James since 2008 when he met Sarah McKinnon. They were married at St. James the following year by the Reverend Canon David Brinton; both volunteer at the Sunday 9 a.m. Services as their time and travels permit. Peter's work experience

has been as a business journalist, CEO of Canadian Importers Association and more recently as an international trade consultant. He is the Honorary Consul of the Republic of Cote d'Ivoire in Toronto, a volunteer position he has held since 1993. Peter was a Second Alternate Synod representative and Alternate at Synod last year. He volunteers as a Sides-person, Reader, Intercessor and Communion minister at St. James. He looks forward to the synergy and camaraderie of Synod gatherings which create a better understanding of the many different and similar issues which other parishes in our Diocese face. He believes that as intractable as some Anglican church problems may seem to us individually, if we are able to discuss them in good faith and humility before God, solutions can be found.

David Gates – Born in Montreal, David was raised in Hamilton, Ontario. Before retirement, he taught at the University of Western Ontario; co-authored two grammar and writing texts; worked in various capacities at The Grand Theatre, London, Ontario; marketed the performing arts at Young People's Theatre and Harbourfront Centre in Toronto; and developed revenue generation resources for the Sunnybrook and St. Michael's Hospital Foundations. He is a graduate of McMaster University and the University of Western Ontario, from which he holds a Ph.D. in English Literature. A lifelong Anglican, he attended the Church of St. Thomas in Hamilton and St. Paul's Cathedral in London, Ontario, before joining the congregation of St. James. Previously he chaired the Stewardship Committee for two years, and most recently he served as Peoples Warden.

Rob Haines has been a member of the Cathedral Community and the Sunday Nine O'clock Service congregation for the past 44 years. He has served in both appointed and elected positions and has volunteered his time, talents, creative nature and leadership skills in many roles. He was involved as a fundraiser for the Cathedral Centre building campaign. Rob has served as a member and chair of the Advisory Board (precursor to our Cathedral Council), a Lay Member of Synod, a member of the Ministry Council, an Education Committee member, a Sidesperson, a Communion Minister and for the last 40 years the Coordinator of the Nine O'clock Stewards. As a Steward and a people person he recognized and acknowledged the talents of members of the congregation and asked them to share their gifts at the Service. Rob trained, scheduled and prepared written guidelines for those who served as Stewards (Sidespersons, Readers, Intercessors, Communion Assistants) and he recommended those who might be asked to serve as Communion Assistants to the Dean. Rob brings his creative insights on building and maintaining community involvement as well as offering a history and his respect for our past. As a Council Member he would serve with enthusiasm and work cooperatively in planning for the growth and future of the St. James Community.

Robert Hart, ODT, has been a member of St. James since 1981, attending the 9:00 am service regularly and serving as a Steward since the formation of that group in 1985. Bob has been a member of the Light for the City Campaign, has served on the Cathedral Council for several years, as Deputy Rector's Warden, two years as Peoples 'Warden and for three years as Rector's Warden. Until June 2013, Bob worked for the York Region District School Board in the capacity of teacher, Department Head, Vice-Principal and, for the final seven years as Principal. Bob was

chair of the Cathedral Selection Committee after the retirement of Dean Douglas Stoute. Since 2013 Bob has been a Diocesan volunteer serving as a mentor to Parish Selection Committees. As well, he participated in a number of Cathedral committees and served in a number of roles (Reader, Intercessor, Communion Minister) during the tenures of Andrew Asbil, Stephen Vail, and Peter Wall. Most recently, Bob served as Assistant Deputy Warden.

Sarah McKinnon is a cradle Anglican who has been a member of St. James since 2001. She attends the 9 a.m. service where she volunteers as a Steward (Sidesperson and Communion Minister). Formerly she served as a Deputy Warden (Rector's and People's) and a Warden (People's) at the time of the planning and construction of the Cathedral Centre.
