Welcome to St. James Cathedral

This sacred land is the territory of several Indigenous Nations - the Wendat, the Haudenosaunee, and the Anishnaabe, and the Métis peoples, with special recognition to the Mississaugas of New Credit. We also acknowledge that we are on the shores of Niigaani-gichigami/Lake Ontario. This territory is governed by the Dish With One Spoon Wampum Belt Treaty, an agreement between the Haudenosaunee Confederacy and the Anishnaabe Confederacy to peaceably share and sustain the life of the Great Lakes. In the spirit of that Treaty we seek to place at the centre of our gatherings the values of respectful reciprocity, diversity, peace, responsibility, and mutual aid.

Liturgical Note:

In the context of Christian Liturgy, Israel does not refer to the current political state, but either to the historic Hebrews of the ancient Near East or, in Christian theology, to all people who put their faith and trust in Jesus Christ.

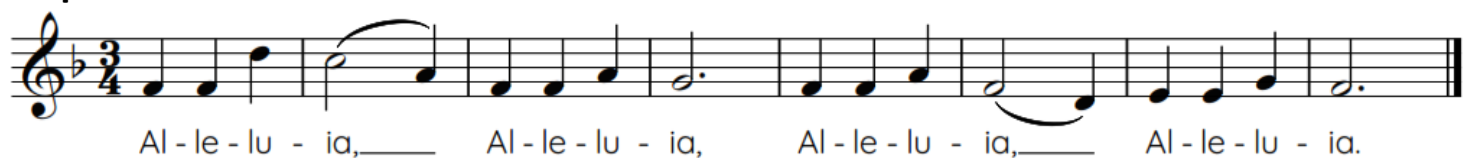

Remembering, therefore, his death, resurrection, and ascension, we await his coming in glory.



How will you observe Lent this year?

Many Christians take on a special practice during the season of Lent, which begins this week with Ash Wednesday. As Dean Stephen shares, “When we think about Lent, we often focus on giving things up. We change our consumption of food and drink, TV and social media, or maybe address some habits we hope to break. That’s all good as far as it goes. But the real purpose of simplifying our lives in Lent is to *take* something up more than to *give* something up. We de-clutter our interior lives to have *more* space for God, for prayer, for service, for people, for love.”

If you haven’t decided on a Lenten practice yet, take some time to reflect this week and ask God how you might make more space for love in the coming weeks. Here are some ideas to start:

- Pray Morning Prayer: Join us on Zoom at 8:30am or watch on YouTube at your convenience.
- Sunday Psalm: Choose a line from the Sunday psalm to pray throughout the day.
- Lenten Small Groups: Participate in one of our Lenten small groups from Feb. 22 - Mar. 22
- Limit digital distractions: Use an app to help you refocus on what’s important to you.
- Give up criticism of others and yourself: When a criticism comes to mind, ask God to replace it with compassion and gratitude.
- List the people who matter to you and connect with one each week during Lent.

Whatever you choose, God’s steadfast love will be with you throughout these 40 days.

AN INVITATION TO LENT

In our tradition, the rhythm of daily life is reflected in our liturgical life. Highs and lows, pleasure and pain, joy and sorrow all find their way in Anglican worship and ongoing formation. Lent takes us from the glory of Christmas, through the wilderness of temptation and the passion, to the glory of the Cross and beyond.

At the conclusion of our Lenten study last year, a request was made for a deeper engagement with the Book of Job. This ancient and unsettling text gives voice to faithful people who suffer, question, protest, and yet remain in relationship with God. Job refuses easy answers. Instead, it invites honest prayer, courageous lament, and trust that endures even when explanations fail.

During Lent, we will reflect on Job through Sunday sermons and Wednesday small group conversations under the theme “Faithfulness in the Midst of Suffering.” Our journey will move from “Blameless and Broken” (Job 1–2), to “When Friends Fail, and God Is Silent” (Job 3–14), to “The Fear of the Lord: Holding on in the Dark” (Job 15–28), to “Out of the Whirlwind” (Job 38–41), and finally “Seeing God Anew” (Job 42).

All are invited to listen, wrestle, and pray together, trusting that God meets us even in the darkest questions. Have a Holy Lent. - Stephen Fields, Vicar
